

Message from the Chair

Welcome to the first newsletter of 2025! It won't be long before spring is here and the Friends will again be welcoming visitors to our tours of the cemetery.

My focus in this message is on the sustainability of the Friends going forward as well as the events planned for the coming year.

Looking ahead to the tour season, we will soon be finalising the themes, researching the stories and collating the information to create our booklets. Work is already underway, but changes are always possible until we are a little further into the process; sometimes there are just not enough interesting stories that fit those planned themes! There are a couple of

important anniversaries this year which have influenced our choice of themes: 80 years since VE Day, and 200 years since the birth of the modern railway. A provisional calendar of tours for 2025 can be found on page 3 of this newsletter.

Alongside all the work to be done preparing for the tour season, we are, of course, continuing with the year-round task of tidying the cemetery. Achieving a balance between conservation of the green space for wildlife and protecting the site as a cemetery which is full of history, is not an easy task - but it is an important one. We are keen to ensure that the site is accessible for relatives looking for and visiting family graves. The site is very large and it takes a lot of effort just to keep on top of simple tasks like clearing ivy from the headstones.

'Sustainability of the Friends'

The brings me to the subject of sustainability of the Friends. None of this work, whether research or 'gardening', is possible without our army of volunteers.

Sadly, our army is shrinking and we really need to build it up. ▶

Tours are conducted on the first Saturday of each month (April through to October) unless stated otherwise.


*The plan for our Nature Matters tour is to hold a slightly longer tour than usual. Visitors are advised to arrive 10 – 15 minutes before the tour's start time.

The hidden details of Broadwater Cemetery: my photographic journey (part five)

When you read this addition, hopefully you will be feeling a little warmer and the sun is begging to shine again. Whatever the weather, it's always good to take a walk in our enchanting cemetery.

Every time I walk through the grand archway entrance, I begin to wonder what I might find to photograph. Yet, I never fail to find something of interest.

Previously, in part four, I included some of the smaller things in life. This time, I have decided to continue with the Macro photography and capture something that perhaps you

would not notice, that is, unless you stopped and really looked hard.

The first thing I spotted was this little snail hiding in a tiny crevice.



When you get up close, the details of this little creature are amazing and colourful.

Not that I have any real knowledge of snails, but you must admit they are beautiful little creatures. That is unless they are eating your garden plants!

That said, the blue colours of this one are lovely.



Continuing along my path, I then came across these two tiny spent acorn shells sitting on a bed of moss.





The large one is less than 10 mm across, but again the details are beautiful.

A few paces away from this scene, I quickly spotted the bright colours of these stunning leaves.







The sun was enhancing their detail and rich damask-like colour.

Talking of plants, I soon came across my next images.

The heads of these flowers were all less than 5 mm across and exquisite when up close.

Finding these sorts of images requires us to slow down. We need to really look before we can begin to fully feel and appreciate our surroundings. I find this process a relaxing, mindful, and enhancing experience.

The following image caught my eye because of its action of breaking open. I am not sure what it is, but I found it fascinating to see the pods opening and catching a moment in time.



My final images are a little different, but I felt I just had to share them with you.

In the five or more years I have been visiting the cemetery, I think I must have seen pretty much everything at some point or other. How wrong I was, when in all that time I have never seen these three items...







Just goes to show if you look hard enough you will always find something you have not seen before.

Paul's corner

I am pleased to report that spring's warmer weather has produced the expected sightings in the cemetery, and with an increase in flowers, the bees, hoverflies and butterflies are seeking the early nectar produced.

A day of warm sunshine increases the opportunity greatly to spot a tumble of Speckled Wood butterflies in the dappled light, or a Large White, Comma, Peacock, or an Orange Tip.

Hoverflies, bees and wasps were out quite early this year. They were seen on the bright yellow lesser celandine (*Ranunculus*) flowers, one of the first flowering in the cemetery this year.

There was also a lovely show of primroses (*Primula*) and lungwort (*Pulmonaria*). This will shortly increase greatly with many more species being evident.

On our first tour of the year at the beginning of April, I requested that visitors give me a shout if they noticed any butterflies en route. They didn't let me down! At one time there were two Sparrowhawks seen flying up high above the cemetery, which caused excitement.

We still have a steady number of volunteers helping at the regular clearance days held on the last Saturday of the month, but we could always do with more attendees. A lot of successful work has been achieved. The council is having a job to keep up with clearing the bagged waste following these sessions.

The wildflower trail is a collection of celebrated sites across Adur and Worthing dedicated to growing wildflowers that encourage pollinators.


